






In 1851, 34 people (14 of them under 16) lived in the 6 Barrack Cottages!

Boxing Day at the Coach & Horses, 1856

James GOLBY (aged 35) who was an agricultural labourer and **John INMAN** (aged 45), a carrier, were in the Coach & Horses at Christmas 1856. They both lived in the Barrack Cottages next door (there were 6 cottages at the time). There was obviously "no love lost between them" and they soon became embroiled in an argument. Inman said he didn't want any row with Golby, but Golby shook his fists in Inman's face and spat twice at him. Inman was wearing a Sussex frock and wiped his face with it. A crowd of friends and relatives began to gather. Inman called Golby "a rogue" and Golby again threatened Inman with his fists.

At a subsequent court hearing, Golby was fined 5 shillings with costs.

NOT SUCH A MERRY CHRISTMAS IN SEDLESCOMBE! – at the Coach & Horses at least

DRUNKEN WOMAN AT THE COACH & HORSES, OCTOBER 1878

INVOLUNTARY LODGERS. The landlord James CAMPANEY reported that a woman named Hannah WILKINS, who doesn't appear to have been local, went into the Coach & Horses, laid down on the floor and refused to move. She was drunk and threatened to break the windows.

P.C. Foot was called and conveyed her to Battle Lock-up.

Later Hannah paid her fine of 10 shillings with 22 shillings costs.

IN THE LATE 19TH CENTURY, A VISITOR TO DIEPPE, FRANCE, WROTE THIS NEWSPAPER REPORT ABOUT HIS CHANCE MEETING WITH "OLD ALF AKEHURST", LATE OF SEDLESCOMBE COACH AND HORSES

"I was suddenly struck by the sound of English voices and hearty laughter. I looked up and saw the lights of a brasserie and a sign 'Albion Tavern: Ye Olde Alf Akehurst from Hastings'.


"By George! I had known him three years ago, when he kept the Coach and Horses in Sedlescomb. He used to ride postillion to the first Lady Brassey. How his name recalled the jingle of posting bells, the clattering of hoofs and electioneering times, of sanded floors, long Horsely pipes, high spindle chairs and ale-house ditties – long walks in Sussex lanes and long, cool draughts of English beer!"




STORM HAVOC AT THE COACH & HORSES IN THE 1930s

"A vivid flash of lightning that came with a deafening thunderclap paralysed Sedlescombe's electric light supply one Sunday evening when it struck the village transformer.

"The same flash struck 3 wireless aerials that met on a tree behind the Coach & Horses Hotel. The wireless set in the hotel lounge was blown off the shelf, smashing a window and was shattered.

Next door at the Tithe Barn tearooms, the lightning flash split the window curtains and put their wireless set out of action!"





"When they reached the village, they made straight for the Coach & Horses pub and the window at the side of the building where underage customers were served.


"Four bags of Smiths crisps please' said Willie grandly, feeling around in his pocket for the precious shilling which he proffered to the landlord.
